## Support for Northlands' Vision 2020 — Aug 31

Both the Highlands and Bellevue community leagues have attended several meetings hosted by Northlands regarding Vision 2020, its new strategy for redevelopment of the existing Northlands site and the non-profit ag society's long-range mission and focus for the future.

The overall scope of Vision 2020 is ambitious and as our league representatives have learned, involves much more than an outdoor festival venue and multiple ice rinks. It outlines a very clear redevelopment of existing amenities, plus new additions and programs that combined, would inject a beneficial revitalization and renewed energy into our area of the city something that is long overdue.

Vision 2020 also aligns with the city's own strategic plans in many ways, especially its The Way We Live initiative, its plans for improving density in mature neighbourhoods plus in many respects, the city's Main Streets plan. Not to be left out, is Northlands' vision for providing mentorship and space for foodrelated entrepreneurs through its <u>FEED</u> program — a program that definitely supports the living and supporting local portion of the city's The Way We Live strategic plan.

But one thing that has not been made clear in the media, is that the Vision 2020 proposal is a starting point — it is not set in stone, nor is it difficult to revise or pare down. Revisions can be made without losing the initial goals set for the ag society, the support for the surrounding communities or ultimately, the residents of Edmonton.

We all know that when the city stamped the approval on Rogers Place and the contract that goes with it, it effectively removed the largest revenue streams for Northlands. And in turn, removed the ability for Northlands to continue making payments to the city on its debt.

While the initial presentation to the city included a debt forgiveness request on the \$48 million outstand- If you are still hesitant, please read Cherie Klassen's ing on the EXPO Centre, Northlands understands that



this would put a financial hardship on the city — Tim Reid, CEO of Northlands has made it clear to those attending the meetings, that the society is now asking for a debt deferral or a re-organization of payments. It's no different than a homeowner trying to renegotiate their mortgage.

In short, Northlands does not want to default on its debt and is looking to work with the city on a revised repayment plan. This is another point that has not been covered in the media — at least not in the articles and TV media that we have seen.

Wednesday, Aug. 31 is not only an important date for Northlands, it is an important date for our communities. Decisions made by council will have a lasting impact on all of Northlands' neighbours, including Highlands and Bellevue.

Northlands has been a wonderful supporter of our two community leagues, including providing financial support for events like Highlandia Fest. As community leagues, we value Northlands for being a great neighbour and a strong advocate of local community living. We also see the long term benefits that will happen to the surrounding neighbourhoods, should the city agree to work with Northlands.

Because of this understanding, both Bellevue and Highlands will be speaking in support of Northlands next Wednesday. We encourage you attend the meeting and lend your support. Or at least, get your information first hand.
